Dear Parents and Parishioners,

Thank you so much for attending our endof-year celebration! We are very happy to be sharing our latest news with you.

On March 3, our children were honored to welcome **His Eminence Metropolitan Apostolos**. We offered him a hand-made gift, and our younger students conducted a brief presentation.

On March 9, our middle school and high school students visited **St. Michael's home for the elderly**, in Yonkers, NY. They performed for the residents and spent some enjoyable time with them.

All our classes worked on Lenten activities to learn about this most important period. We faithfully participated in the icon procession on Sunday of Orthodoxy, and venerated the Cross on the Veneration of the Holy Cross. We also worked on service projects. Following our Lord's command on Matthew 25:31-46, we sent Pascha greeting cards to Christian prisoners through the Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry. Additionally, we organized our first Senior Fun Night, where the children of our parish took care of our pappoudes and giagiades. It was an enjoyable evening of treats, games, and fellowship, and we look forward to doing it again next year.

We also took part in an **international Pascha Exchange:** We prepared greeting cards, videos, and little gifts, which we exchanged with children from other Orthodox communities around the world.

Religious education is not only for children! During Lent, our head and spiritual guide, Fr Evgenios Tsaramanidis, started an **evening** adult Bible study class which was very well attended. It will continue next year.

Our directors, catechists, and students were proud to take part in the **Greek Independence Day parade** on April 14, together with our other ministries.

On Lazarus Saturday, we helped prepare palm crosses for Palm Sunday. Our families were present at church throughout Holy Week. On Holy Friday, our Myrofores and a large group of Altar Servers did a wonderful job honoring the Epitaphios. We are really proud of them!

Finally, on **Mother's Day**, the children prepared a card honoring the Theotokos, to ask for her blessing for their mothers and thank them for their love and care.

We are very thankful for our older male students who have been diligently serving as **Altar Servers and readers**. Congratulations on a job well done!

During Lent, our co-director Natalia Tzobanakis-Theocharopoulou started attending the **chanter's stand** as an extension of her catechesis effort. She is grateful for the understanding and support of our community, as she is learning about this ministry which is entirely new to her.

We would like to **extend our heartfelt thanks** to the parents and grandparents who have been making every effort to bring the children to class on Sundays. It makes a great difference.
